



U.S. Security Assistance Programs	
IMET	International Military Education and Training: program that provides grants for members of foreign militaries to receive U.S. military training; funded by the Foreign Operations budget
E-IMET	Expanded International Military Education and Training: subset of the IMET program that offers only non-lethal training with an emphasis on human rights
FMF	Foreign Military Financing: grants to allow eligible nations to purchase weapons, training, and other defense articles and services from the United States; funded by the Foreign Operations budget
DCS	Direct Commercial Sales: arms sales concluded between U.S. weapons manufacturers and foreign clients and managed by the U.S. Department of State
FMS	Foreign Military Sales: arms sales concluded between the U.S. government and foreign governments and managed by the U.S. Department of Defense
EDA	Excess Defense Articles: program that provides surplus or obsolete U.S. weaponry to eligible countries at drastically reduced prices or at no cost
NADR	Nonproliferation, Anti-terrorism, Demining and Related Programs: section of the Foreign Operations budget that allocates funds for nuclear nonproliferation, anti-terrorism, demining, and small arms destruction efforts
JCET	Joint Combined Exchange Training: training of foreign militaries with U.S. Special Forces teams
CTFP	Regional Defense Counterterrorism Fellowship Program: program started in FY 02 that supplies grants for military training similar to that offered by the IMET program, but funded by the Defense budget, which is not regulated by the Foreign Assistance Act nor subject to its restrictions
PKO	Peacekeeping Operations: section of the Foreign Operations budget that allocates funds to support peacekeeping efforts worldwide and to encourage and support regional and multilateral peacekeeping activities
Section 1206	Section 1206 of the National Defense Authorization Act: authority first granted by Congress in FY 06 that allows the Pentagon to train and equip foreign militaries with funds from the Defense budget, which are not regulated by the Foreign Assistance Act nor subject to its restrictions
